What is a hate crime?	investigated by school officials and the harassment made to stop. If your child is harassed in school, on the way to school, on a school bus, at a school event or even on-line after school hours, the harassment should be reported immediately. If you are not satisfied with the results of the school's actions, you can file a complaint with the Human Rights Commission. A crime against another person because of that person's race, color, national origin, religion, disability, sex, gender identity, or sexual orientation is a hate crime.
